What We Are Writing About

Book review - *Weird Ideas That Work: How to Build a Creative Company* By Robert I Sutton

This book is now seven years old which dates some of the examples and stories that are used to back up the main ideas. However those ideas are still relevant.

The author starts out by discussing the tensions between having a great execution capacity and having a great creative capacity. In many cases a great execution capacity is about doing things consistently and well, while a great creative capacity is about changing things around, doing things differently, and breaking some of the rules and failing. It is important that people understand the differences. No one wants to get on a flight from Melbourne to Sydney and hear the pilots say "I am going to try a bit of creative flying today". So each capacity needs to be applied in the right context. However that is very difficult to do in practice so this book is about trying to help you achieve that balance. [Read More...](#)
